Stay COOL this Summer

It's July in Georgia and that means it's hot outside. With the excitement of barbeques, pool parties, and family adventures, it can be easy to forget about the impact summer can have on energy bills. Even though temperatures may be sweltering outside, you can still save with smarter energy usage inside your home. We can help with some tips to make your summer sizzle without burning through your energy budget:

- 1. <u>Thermostat Optimization</u>: Experts recommend setting your thermostat at 78°F when you're at home. Raise it a few degrees when you're away to reduce cooling costs <u>without</u> sacrificing comfort. When you're in a room, turn ceilings fans on (instead of lowering the temperature setting on the thermostat) to stay at a comfortable temperature.
- Turn off Lights and Fans: When you leave a room or when you are no longer being cooled by a fan...flip the switch and turn it "off." No sense in wasting that electricity when it is benefiting no one.
- 3. <u>Seal in the Cool</u>: Keep the heat outside where it belongs by sealing gaps around doors and windows. This simple step prevents the cool air from escaping and warm air from sneaking in.
- 4. <u>Grill and Chill</u>: Take the cooking outdoors and fire up the grill! Using your stove or oven can heat up your home; making your AC work harder.
- 5. <u>Keep out the Heat</u>: Close blinds or window coverings to prevent heat gain during the day.

We are Prepared for Summer Storms

Summer brings fun in the sun, but it can also bring occasional afternoon storms. In the event of a power outage, you can trust that the staff at Sawnee EMC is ready to respond.

The major cause of most power outages comes from damage caused by wind, falling trees and lightning. We



work year-round, to ensure that the power lines in our service territory stand a smaller risk of being damaged by trees, branches or other types of vegetation.

Despite our best efforts, during storms, damage can occur to power lines and equipment. When this happens, our first priority is to safely restore power to as many members as possible, in the shortest amount of time. We start by mobilizing line crews and other critical staff. The biggest problems are handled first, such as damage to transmission lines, which serve thousands of people. These problems must be corrected before we can focus on other areas where more localized damage may have occurred.

Sawnee EMC's crews inspect substations to determine if the problem starts there, or if there could be an issue down the line. Next, crews check the facilities that deliver power into neighborhoods and communities. Crews then repair the damaged lines, restoring power to more people.

If you experience an outage at your home or business, chances are your electric meter has already notified Sawnee EMC.
